<p><b>Human features and landmarks</b></p>	<p><b>AOL: World</b> Human features are man-made and include houses, shops, buildings, offices, parks, streets and places of worship. <b>Name and talk about man-made features in the local environment, including shops, houses, streets and parks.</b> (G1)</p> <p>covered optional x 2</p>	<p>Human features are man-made and include factories, farms, houses, offices, ports, harbours and shops. <p><b>Settlements and land use</b></p>	<p><b>AOL: World</b> <b>Describe a contrasting environment to their own.</b> (G2)</p> <p>covered optional x 4</p>	<p>A settlement is a place where people live and work and can be big or small, depending on how many people live there. Towns and cities are urban settlements. Features of towns and cities include homes, shops, roads and offices. Identify the characteristics of a settlement.</p> <p>covered x 3 optional x 4</p>
<p><b>Climate and weather</b></p>	<p><b>AOL: World</b> There are four seasons in the United Kingdom: spring, summer, autumn and winter. Each season has typical weather patterns. <b>Record observations about the way the local environment changes throughout each season.</b> (G3)</p> <p>covered optional</p>	<p>There are four seasons in the UK: spring, summer, autumn and winter. Each season has typical weather patterns. Types of weather include sun, rain, wind, snow, fog, hail and sleet. In the United Kingdom, the length of the day varies depending on the season. In winter, the days are shorter. In summer, the days are longer. Symbols are used to show different types of weather. Identify patterns in daily and seasonal weather.</p> <p>covered x 2 optional</p>
<p><b>Physical processes</b></p>	<p><b>AOL: World</b> All types of weather can affect the environment and how we use it. For example, on sunny days, people might go to the park or the coastline. On cold, icy days, roads and rivers can be frozen. <b>Describe how different types of weather affect the local environment.</b> (G4)</p> <p>optional</p>	<p>Weather is a physical process. Describe in simple terms how a physical process or human behaviour has affected an area, place or human activity.</p> <p>covered</p>
<p><b>Geographical resources</b></p>	<p><b>AOL: World</b> Maps and photographs can be used to show key features of the local environment. <b>Use photographs and maps to identify and describe human and physical features from their locality.</b> (G5)</p> <p>optional x 3</p>	<p>An aerial photograph or plan perspective shows an area of land from above. Identify features and landmarks on an aerial photograph or plan perspective.</p> <p>covered x 2</p>

<p><b>Data analysis</b></p>		<p>Data is information that can be collected and used to answer a geographical question. Collect simple data during fieldwork activities.</p> <p>covered optional</p>
<p><b>Fieldwork</b></p>	<p><b>AOL: World</b> Fieldwork includes going on walks and visits to collect information about the environment. Take photographs, draw simple picture maps and collect simple data during fieldwork activities. (G6)</p> <p>covered x 4 optional</p>	<p>Fieldwork includes going out in the environment to look, ask questions, take photographs, take measurements and collect samples. Carry out fieldwork tasks to identify characteristics of the school grounds or locality.</p> <p>covered x 3</p>
<p><b>Natural and man-made materials</b></p>		<p>A material is something used to build or make something else. Natural materials are dug out of the ground, grown or taken from a living thing. Man-made materials are often made from natural materials but have been changed to have different properties. Identify natural and man-made materials in the environment.</p> <p>covered</p>
<p><b>Physical features</b></p>		<p>Physical features are naturally-created features of the Earth. Use basic geographical vocabulary to identify and describe physical features, such as beach, cliff, coast, forest, hill, mountain, sea, ocean, river, soil, valley and vegetation.</p> <p>covered x 2</p>
<p><b>Environment</b></p>	<p><b>AOL: World</b> Litter has a harmful effect on the areas where we live, work and play. People need to put their rubbish into the bin and not throw it on the ground. Describe ways to look after the immediate environment. (G7)</p> <p>covered</p>	<p>Litter and pollution have a harmful effect on the areas where we live, work and play. Describe how pollution and litter affect the local environment and school grounds.</p> <p>covered x 2 optional</p>
<p><b>Sustainability</b></p>		<p>Natural environments can be affected by the actions of humans, including cutting down trees or dropping litter. Humans can protect the environment by choosing to preserve woodlands and hedgerows, recycling where possible and disposing of waste carefully. (G9)</p> <p>optional x 4</p>	<p>The United Kingdom (UK) is a union of four countries: England, Northern Ireland, Scotland and Wales. A capital city is a city that is home to the government and ruler of a country. London is the capital city of England, Belfast is the capital city of Northern Ireland, Edinburgh is the capital city of Scotland and Cardiff is the capital city of Wales. The countries of the United Kingdom are made up of cities, towns and villages. Name and locate the four countries of the UK and their capital cities on a map, atlas or globe.</p> <p>covered x 3 optional x 2</p>
Location	<p>AOL: World Describe how the weather, plants and animals of one place is different to another using simple geographical terms. (G10)</p> <p>covered x 6 optional x 3</p>	<p>Warmer areas of the world are closer to the equator and colder areas of the world are further from the equator. The equator is an imaginary line that divides the Earth into two parts: the Northern and Southern Hemispheres. Continents have different climates depending on where they are in the world. The climate of a place can be identified by the types of weather, plants and animals found there. Locate hot and cold areas of the world in relation to the equator.</p> <p>covered</p>
Position	<p>AOL: Maths Positional language is used to describe where things are in relation to one another. Positional language includes in, on, next to, behind, in front of, in between, above, below and underneath. Use simple positional language to describe where things are in relation to each other and give directions. (G11)</p> <p>covered x 4 optional x 2</p>	<p>Positional language includes behind, next to and in front of. Directional language includes left, right, straight ahead and turn. Use simple directional and positional language to give directions, describe the location of features and discuss where things are in relation to each other.</p> <p>covered x 5 optional</p>
Maps	<p>AOL: World A map is a picture or drawing of an area of land or sea. Make and use simple maps in their play to represent places and journeys, real and imagined. (G12)</p> <p>covered x 7 optional x 6</p>	<p>A map is a picture or drawing of an area of land or sea that can show human and physical features. A key is used to show features on a map. A map has symbols to show where things are located. Draw or read a simple picture map.</p> <p>covered x 3 optional x 2</p>

<p><b>Significant places</b></p>	<p><b>AOL: World</b> A place can be important because of its location, use buildings or landscape. <b>Discuss and describe places that are important to them.</b> (G14) covered optional x 3</p>	<p>A place can be important because of its location, buildings, landscape, community, culture and history. Important buildings can include schools, places of worship and buildings that provide a service to the community, such as shops and libraries. Some buildings are important because they tell us something about the past. Name important buildings and places and explain their importance. covered x 2 optional</p>
